

written policy (Regents Policy 4400) that promotes the achievement of diversity. The policy states that diversity has been the "source of innovative ideas and creative accomplishments" and goes on to note that these differences between people include "race, ethnicity, gender, age, religion, language, abilities/disabilities, sexual orientation, gender identity, socioeconomic status, geographic region, and more". As a result, individual campuses have created administrative bureaucracies. For example, the one at UCLA includes a vice-chancellorship for equity, diversity, and inclusion and an annual budget in excess of \$4 million. The UCLA Intergroup Relations Office provides credit courses for students to "explore their social identities".

The University of California system has an official

In order to insure that attention to diversity remains entrenched in the system, governing rules have been written into the University of California Academic Personnel Policy (known as APM-210). That document mandates that faculty should make "contributions furthering diversity and equal opportunity" and develop or utilize techniques to address the professional advancement of individuals who are in "under-represented groups". This mandate even includes research activities.

In a recent editorial in the Los Angeles Times, Heather MacDonald questioned the rationale behind this requirement, in particular the necessity for faculty seeking promotions to document their contributions to diversity. She pointed out that much research (e.g., various fields of science) has nothing to do with diversity. She noted that Albert Einstein would likely have failed this litmus test because he was too busy working out the theory of relativity. To quote her, "Unlocking the secrets of nature is challenge enough; scientists (and other faculty) should not also be tasked with a 'social justice' mission".

I found myself strongly agreeing with Ms. MacDonald that the University of California overall is obsessed by diversity. Unfortunately, by requiring faculty to spend time in the diversity arena, the university is taking time away from them to do their primary research and teaching. Furthermore, I would submit that the premise of the University is wrong. The responsibility for innovation and creativity belongs to individuals, not to diversity. Enforcing diversity only leaves less time for those individuals to innovate and create.
