And, of course, my partner in arms, Trisha, made sure everything was perfect and designed and executed the beautiful centerpieces.

just read an interesting post on Facebook, which Li'm going to paraphrase here. It told the story of a new first-time Master who, being excited about presiding at his first Stated Meeting, personally visited every Lodge member and invited him to attend. When it came time to open Lodge, he was dismayed that no one attended. The new Master then mailed all the members a Summons to attend a Masonic funeral for their deceased Lodge the following Monday night. Curious about there being a funeral for a dead Lodge, the members all attended and, when they arrived, there was a coffin elaborately draped in flowers. After the coffin was opened, the young master requested the Brethren to file past the coffin view their dead Lodge. As the Brethren filed past the open coffin and looked inside they each saw themselves reflected in a mirror that had been strategically placed in the coffin.

The lesson, my Brothers, is that the Lodge is you: Each and every one of you. A "Lodge" is a gathering of Brothers together in the style of Masons. It is NOT a building or a room. You will notice that I capitalize the word "Lodge." I do this to set it apart from the word "lodge" which is merely an edifice.

I f any Lodge is going to succeed, including our own, it is up to each and every Brother to make it so. That means paying dues on time; Attending Stated meetings, Degrees and events to the greatest extent possible; Donating to Masonic charities within your means; Advancing through the Degrees; Becoming an officer or participating in one of the many committees; Calling or visiting ailing Brethren; Treating your Brothers as brothers even when you disagree with each other.

Loop could go on and on about what it takes to be a Mason and not just a member, but hopefully, you get it by now. It takes more than just "showing up" to be a good Mason, but it does take showing up. Remember that when you complain that events aren't to your liking or the food at Stated Meetings is "no good." If you don't like something, do something about it. Plan an event. Chair a Stated Meeting dinner. This is your Lodge. Without YOU, it's only a lodge.

A s always, we look forward to seeing you in Lodge: Not just at stated meetings and degrees but at all our social and educational events.

THINK ABOUT IT

For much of my life, going to the movies was an exciting and fun event. It was an opportunity to get away from real life and just be entertained for a couple of hours. Most years, I then looked forward to watching the Oscar ceremonies, in part to relive some of those moments. However, in the more recent past, the Oscars have become an event for me to avoid. The 2019 version occurred last night and there were a number of articles about it in today's LA Times. These articles reflect my growing disenchantment with the process.

Mary McNamara wrote that the Oscars have not changed enough in that there are still inadequate numbers of women and minorities being recognized. She described the appearance of Mike Myers and Dana Carvey together as the "sight of two white men" and that the evening ended "with a bunch of white guys thanking the academy". Josh Rottenberg began with a story that was purportedly about the winning picture, "Green Book", but contained much commentary about diversity. He focused on winners who were women and/or of non-white ethnicity.

Justin Chang had some less than flattering comments about Green Book. "Green Book might make audiences feel good. But given its pat handling of the subject, they shouldn't." His concern appeared to be that the movie

did not explore racism and homosexuality in enough detail and from the black or gay perspective. He referred to viewers as a "white audience that still believes stories of justice and progress will always have to be negotiated on their terms".

Interestingly, in a tribute to the recentlydeceased choreographer Stanley Donen, Kenneth Turan praised the old MGM musical "Singin in the Rain". He called it "the most durable example of the Hollywood musical, the real tinsel underneath all the fake stuff".

I guess that my problem is that I want to pay my money to see a movie that will entertain me; as an aside, I was entertained by Green Book (and previously by Singin' in the Rain). If I want to support political issues, I can make donations to various causes, but I certainly would not do so with an expectation that that money will provide me with entertainment. The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences is composed of individuals whose job in life is to create stories that will give me an opportunity to forget the day to day stresses of reality. I do not need a system that rates the worth of movies on perceptions of social justice.

Think about it.
