

FROM THE WEST

Asons are driven by a commitment to take care of one another and their communities. This has improved lives in California since before the state was formed. During the gold rush, and the severe hardship that followed, Masons in the area provided food and relief to struggling families. When cholera swept through Sacramento in 1850, Masons helped build a hospital at Sutter's Fort. You can read more about this legacy of giving and the history of Masonic charity in California in the California Freemason magazine.

It was in this spirit of charity that California Masons created our Masonic Homes. In 1898, in what is now Union City, the fraternity opened the first California Masonic Home in order to care for Masonic widows and orphans. About 16,000 members donated all funds for the land, materials, and building construction. Eleven years later, the fraternity opened a second home in Southern California in Covina. More than a century later, these original two buildings have evolved into our present-day retirement communities in Union City and Covina.

Over the years, we have also developed outreach and youth programs that are able to reach every community in California. These support services are relied upon by hundreds of families, both with and without Masonic affiliation. New and expanded facilities are currently under construction on both the Union City and Covina campuses. In fact, the Cornerstone for the new Skilled Nursing Facility on the Covina campus is scheduled for July 13, 2019, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Everyone is invited to attend this historic occasion.

The Masonic Homes Of California continue to be funded by the donations of California Masons. For many years, Ionic Composite Lodge has been one of the most charitable Lodges in California. THINK ABOUT IT

Tam hardly a fan of most current music. I occasionally hear the name of some popular entertainer, but it goes completely by me. My usual response, when I have to respond (as when my grandchildren are discussing the topic with me), is to ask who he or she is. Usually the person is famous for some song that I also did not know.

Thus, when the news came out that Nipsey Hussle was shot and killed in Los Angeles, it had no immediate impact on me. In fact, I first thought the story was about Nipsey Russell, a comedian with whom I was familiar from his appearances on television in the 1960s and 1970s, but I quickly realized that that Nipsey had died over a decade earlier.

For those of you who, like me, were unfamiliar with Nipsey Hussle, let me begin by telling you that he grew up in south-central Los Angeles and was involved with the gangs in his neighborhood. His name at that time was Ermias Davidson Asghedom. However, he did go on to become a rap music artist and achieved much success in that field. He has been nominated for Grammy awards in the past and he was a very popular person among the younger set.

D ut it was not the entertainment aspect of his **D**life that led me to reconsider what he had already accomplished in his life and where that life was going when it was prematurely terminated. Like many other successful entertainers, Hipsey made a substantial amount of money. However, he plowed much of those proceeds back into his old neighborhood, opening up businesses that serviced his community and provided jobs for other disadvantaged young people. In fact, while he recognized that most fans follow sports stars and entertainers, he observed that it would be more appropriate to model oneself after successful entrepreneurs instead. He was supposed to meet with law enforcement officials on the day after the shooting to discuss methods to curtail gang violence.

While I suspect that I still will not care for his music, I now have a much more favorable perspective of his character. Having learned about the man, I truly regret his passing, especially since it was unnecessary and premature. Hipsey Russell reminded me to should judge a person by his or her actions, not by his or her image.

Think about it.
