

THINK ABOUT IT

Dipti Barot is a primary care physician in the San Francisco area. She recently wrote an oped piece in the Los Angeles Times that dealt with the problem that most of us are facing regarding the availability of the COVID-19 vaccine. Both of her parents live in the San Francisco Bay area and are near 80 years of age. Unfortunately, they both have some type of blood cancer for which they are receiving chemotherapy. Given their conditions, it would appear that they both would be high up in the line for being vaccinated, or at least so Dr. Barot thought.

In mid-January, the state of California expanded the pool of eligible vaccine recipients beyond healthcare workers and residents of nursing homes to include those who were over the age of 65. Her father happened to have an appointment the next day with his own doctor and he inquired at that time about getting the vaccine. He was told to call the "vaccine hotline" to schedule one, but was unable to even get through for the following two days. However, he was ultimately successful, although the date he was given was weeks away and at a facility 50 miles from their home.

Dr. Barot then described the hardships of making that 100-mile round trip in congested traffic and rain, witnessing an overturned vehicle in the midst of a three-car accident along the way. Dr. Barot also noted that, in order for her to take them, she had to "manage to take the day off work". Dr. Barot concluded her tale of travail by expressing concern for other elderly and sick people who have even fewer resources to work the system.

While the story is certainly one worthy of some sympathy, I was struck by Dr. Barot's emotional response to it. By her account, she did not

feel any elation over being able to accomplish the goal of getting the vaccine to her parents. Instead, she stated that she was enraged at how hard it was, blaming a "broken" healthcare system and failure at all levels of leadership.

What surprised me was Dr. Barot's lack of awareness about how to deal with a scarcity of resources. While her parents' plight was obvious, why did she think that their situation was that much different from many others who were also trying to get vaccinated? In fact, given her frontline view as a doctor, one would think that she would be more prepared for it. It was interesting that she did not mention whether or not she herself, as a doctor, had already received the vaccine and how hard that process was.

I graduated from medical school in 1967 and, ever since then, I have been struck by how poorly my colleagues appreciate the limitations of healthcare resources. In the name of doing whatever they can for individual patients (and perhaps for their own benefit as well), they continue to order tests and medications (often unnecessarily), blaming the high cost of healthcare on greedy insurance companies and lawyers, demanding families, and anybody else other than themselves. The reality of the vaccine is that it is truly scarce and money alone won't fix the problem in the near future. What might have been a more useful piece of information from Dr. Barot would have been suggestions about what we should stop doing if we are going to give a higher vaccine priority to elderly people with blood cancers. Where has her anger been up to now?
