FROM THE EAST

Dear Brethren

I am pleased to announce that we held our first degree conferral since the onset of COVID during this past month. Brother Michael Mosbach, who is personally responsible for our being able to hold our November 19th gala celebration at the Del Rey Yacht Club, passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on April 11, 2022. Special thanks to several members of Culver City Foshay Lodge no. 467, especially their Senior Deacon, Brother Jason Berry, who assisted in the work. We always appreciate it when our brethren from other lodges join us for our events, and I encourage you all to do the same for them as you can.

Next, a word on our building. At the April Stated meeting, I formally announced the close of escrow on the sale of our Lodge building, and we voted to amend our charter and bylaws to move our meeting place to 2244 Westwood Blvd (aka: Liberal Arts Lodge). PLEASE NOTE: this move will not take effect until our July Stated Meeting. Meetings in May and June will still be at 1122 La Cienega Blvd. as before. We currently have two candidates going through the clearing and investigation phases of application, and we hope to ballot on one of them at the May Stated meeting, and hold the degree conferral in June. The reason for the delay is that certain senior officers (myself especially) will be out of town for most of the month of May. I will be leaving the day after the Stated meeting on May 2nd to be with my brother in Washington, DC, for the arrival of the newest member of the family, a little girl. My mother and I will be there to help with their firstborn (Samuel) and help his transition to being a big brother, as well to help with the newborn, etc.

While planning and coordinating move items have already begun, they will continue throughout April and May, and the final move out of our current building will occur towards the end of June. Please keep your eyes peeled for the last Stated Meeting and Degree conferrals in our old building, and make a point of showing up, both to support our new brother, and to say goodbye to our longtime home.

Finally, I want to be clear regarding something many have expressed concerns about. We are not throwing out our history during this move. The pictures of the Past Masters, for instance, have been taken down from the walls in the dining room, but this was done so that we could digitize them, as well as prepping them for storage. Similarly, much of our art will be moving with us to our new home (be it short or long term) at Liberal Arts. The rest will be placed in storage. Likewise, any chairs in the lodge room that bear the names of brethren will have those name plaques removed, and the plaques will be stored unless the brethren or their families specifically request their return. Plaques attached to the large, freestanding dais chairs will not be removed, as those chairs will either move with us or be stored.

This is the season of new beginnings, of Rebirth. It is a time when we embrace the future without sacrificing or forgetting the value of the past. It will take adjustment. It will take work. There will be challenges, but we will face them together as Brethren, and we will come out stronger for having met them. I am confident that, as a Lodge, we will not only survive, but thrive in the next chapter of our shared Masonic journey. For everything there is a Season, and a Time for every Purpose under Heaven. This is the season of change, and we will remember in whom we put our trust, and we will not be afraid.



THINK ABOUT IT

According to a story in the Los Angeles Times, community colleges have a chronic problem with students dropping out because of stresses over trying to maintain a good grade point average (or GPA) while also having to work and/or deal with social or health issues. In an effort to maintain enrollment, they are now offering students an option to forego a letter grade and just be judged as having passed or not passed a particular course. Furthermore, the student can delay his or her decision as to which system (letter grade or pass/no pass) to use until the last day of class instruction. This grading method was originally introduced to deal with the COVID pandemic, but it is now a permanent change in community college practices.

The Times story began by describing the plight of a 20-year old man who had to take a biology course in order to fulfill the requirement to transfer to a 4-year university. In this case, he wanted to obtain a bachelor's degree in political science at the University of California at Berkeley. However, biology was clearly not a subject in which he excelled and a low grade would adversely impact his GPA and his prospects of being accepted at Berkeley as well as his underlying anxiety and depression. For him, the ability to opt for a pass grade made a big difference in his decision to stay at the community college.

While I do have sympathy for his plight, I am more concerned about how the entire posthigh school educational system in California will be affected by this policy. Allegedly the pass/no pass grading system will not be available for courses that would be critical to a student's ultimate major, but it is not clear what these precise restrictions are or why these particular ones were created. In fact, if specific courses are not deemed to be important, why are they even in the curriculum?

The various University of California and California State University campuses have already decided to abandon SAT scores when considering high school applicants for admission, relying on what they claim is a better standard, GPAs. Now they will have to decide which community college transfer applicants to accept without the benefit of complete GPAs. It is likely that the pass/no pass option will be exercised only by students who are doing less well than they hoped. While some may employ it only to protect a very high GPA by avoiding a B grade, many may be on the border of failing. How is an Admissions Committee to know which is the case? If a student is expected to master particular courses, why make evidence of such mastery more obscure? Are we even going to see the pass or no pass criterion become the standard of grading throughout our entire educational system?

Life creates stressful situations for all of us. When will our educational system accept this fact and let students learn how to handle it instead of lowering expectations?
