

FROM THE SOUTH

Dear Brethren,

THINK ABOUT IT

According to an article in the November 21st issue of the New York Times, sports betting has become the fastest-growing expansion of legalized gambling in the United States. This phenomenon was made possible in 2018 when the Supreme Court issued a ruling that states could legalize wagers on live sports events. The article was largely directed at criticizing the gambling industry for failing to live up to expectations about how much money this endeavor would raise for some state and local governments. However it was another aspect of this practice that caught my attention.

A year earlier, Sports Illustrated dedicated an entire issue to the topic of sports betting. One commentator reflected on earlier pronouncements by various sports representatives. He noted that, in 2012, David Stern, commissioner of the National Basketball Association, was critical of Chris Christie, the governor of New Jersey, saying "New Jersey has no idea what it's doing and doesn't care because all it's interested in is making a buck or two". Bud Selig, who was then the commissioner of Major League Baseball, was appalled by the idea of liberalizing sports betting beyond Nevada, saying that such gambling is "evil, creates doubt, and destroys your sport".

Now fast-forward a decade or so. The National Football League, which would not allow Tony Romo to host a fantasy football convention in Las Vegas in 2015, now has created betting partnerships with a number of sportsbooks and airs commercials for DraftKings and FanDuel during their games. Many major league baseball teams have similar arrangements. For example, the Chicago Cubs collect at least \$100 million dollars from DraftKings every year.

With this as our current environment, consider the case of Pete Rose. Mr. Rose had a 24-year career (1963-1986) as a major league baseball player. During that time, he became (and remains) the all-time leader for total base hits (4,256), games played (3,562), at bats (14,053), and even outs (10,328). He was widely known as "Charlie Hustle" for his practice of never letting up on the field. From 1984 to 1989, he also managed the Cincinnati Reds. However, in August 1989, Major League Baseball placed him on its "Permanently Ineligible" list and ended his baseball career. In 1991, the Baseball Hall of Fame officials adopted a policy that anybody on that list would be banned from admission. Over the intervening years, he has lost multiple appeals for reinstatement, the last one being in 2020. Thus, to this day Pete Rose cannot be so honored. What was his crime? He bet on baseball games!
