Dear Brethren,

I recently returned from the Master's Leadership Retreat, and I was privileged to hear from Right Worshipful Art Salazar, the Senior Grand Warden, as he revealed his logo and theme for his upcoming year in '24-'25. His theme is both simple and profound, consisting of only a single word: Inspire.

While some Grand Master's themes are more mottos or slogans, such as "Coming Home", "Applied Freemasonry", or even this year's theme of "Fulfilling our Obligations", RW Salazar's theme is a call to action – an order. It is a directive to get out into the world and help change it by showing people that they can be better; that there is a better way. Tying in with the Grand Lodge 2025 plan, this takes the idea of Positive Awareness to its logical end – by showing the world who we are and what we do in a visible way, we have the ability to bring new life, vigor, and prosperity not just to the Fraternity, but to the world as well.

While I would certainly love to have you come more often, if you can't come on Monday nights, consider looking into going to one of the local Youth Orders on another night of the week. Consider supporting our young leaders now, because now of all times, Masons need to stand proud and strong as beacons of Light in the Darkness. FROM THE WEST

Brethren and Ladies,

A while back I attended a funeral for one of our departed Brethren and, while waiting for the service to begin, I was perusing the Yizkor Memorial Service prayer book that had been provided by the mortuary. As I am usually do under these circumstances, I was contemplating both life and death and my attention focused on a portion of one of the prayers that read:

> "The number of our years may be many or few,

"Yet vain toil fills their span, "For it is soon ended, and we fly away. "So teach us to number our days that we may grow wise in heart."

This passage reminded me of our own teachings where we are urged to

"... remember that we are traveling upon the level of time, to 'that undiscovered country, from whose bourne no traveler returns.'"

Time, not money, is the most important spendable asset we posses. We may have a great deal of money or only a small amount, but we always know how much money we posses and can always earn more of it. Unlike money, we never know how much more time we posses and can never replace the time we've spent.

There are two lessons we can draw from this fact. First, we should never waste our own time. I'm not saying we should never relax or have a good time. Leisure is a perfectly legitimate use of time. After all, one of the reasons we work is so we can spend time doing the things we enjoy. No, the waste of time of which I am writing is "sloth". Using that word recalls Brother Ben Franklin, who said things like, "Sloth, like rust, consumes faster than labor wears, while the used key is always bright" and "Sloth makes all things difficult, but industry all easy." To me, "sloth" is just laying around doing nothing: not working, but not relaxing, either. This is simply a waste of our own valuable time.

Secondly, we should never waste the time of other people. I suppose that wasting the time of other people is the greater of the two evils. At least by wasting our own time we aren't stealing that time from anyone else. We waste the time of others not just when we are late, but also when we don't do what we are supposed to do when we are supposed to do it. Here, those that counted on us are forced to waste their time while we do what should have already been accomplished.

Hoping that you haven't felt that this article has been a waste of your time, I want to put in a special plug for the last entry in our upcoming Festive Board at which our lodge Ladies and Widows will be honored. 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THINK ABOUT IT

For some time now, our society has been concerned about perceived inequalities in the workplace based on such things as race or gender. This has even been a focus of attention in the medical field. Most individual medical organizations, composed primarily of doctors, have created committees to address and eliminate "inequities" in their particular specialties.

In the March 16, 2023 issue of the New England Journal of Medicine, three female physicians, Suzanne Koven, Jessica Haberer, and Deborah Kwolek, wrote a column addressing this issue. It was entitled "Pregnancy and residency – overdue for equity". Residency training (which includes internship) is the period of time between when one graduates from medical school and one begins his or her medical practice in the community. It lasts for several years and is the time when one takes care of patients under the supervision of more experienced physicians. The precise number of years depends on the particular specialty.

Dr. Koven had become pregnant during her internship and was not offered any alteration in her schedule. She developed preeclampsia which required a month of bedrest, and, after her baby was delivered by emergency Caesarian section, was plagued with months of guilt (regarding the work transferred to others) and exhaustion (long work shifts and caring for a newborn). Dr. Haberer avoided getting pregnant until she finished her residency, subjecting herself to various risks related to being older when carrying a baby. Dr. Kwolek took leaves during her residency, delaying her graduation from that program for 2 years (stalling her career).

All of these events occurred in the 1980s and 1990s, a time when, as these three women claimed, "that was simply the way it was". While stating that "incremental progress" has since been made, even today residents (presumably female ones) believe that they have these same limitations if they desire to become pregnant. They attributed the reluctance for the system to make changes to be due, at least in part, to a "male-dominated culture". They believe that there is a lack of "gender equity" in medicine and argued for changes so that trainees who wish to become parents will be able to have a reasonable work-life balance, as that would ultimately strengthen both the medical profession and society.

One proposal that they made was to have "advanced practitioners" (the older and more experienced supervisors) cover the work load that would exist from the absence of a pregnant trainee. This particular recommendation struck me as very peculiar if not completely contrary to their concerns. Adding more work to others did not seem to be to be equitable at all; it just changed what some have perceived as inequitable to one that others would find inequitable.

In fact, this entire call for gender equity disregards a basic biologic truism. Pregnancy is not a universal condition; it only occurs in relatively young females. Men and women are not created equal biologically. When I, as a training director, was personally confronted with this issue many years ago, I proposed that the pregnant trainee do the rotations that required more hours of work early in her pregnancy and have a softer schedule later on. I would suggest that any person considering a career in medicine carefully consider all of the advantages and disadvantages of that profession, and accept them, before even applying to medical school.
