Dear Brethren,

At our 100th Anniversary Gala last November, and again starting with Installation and the New Year, I announced that I intended to bring back events at which we honored our First Responders and Public Education teachers and workers this year. I am pleased to announce that this month, we do indeed start with the first of those events. This August Stated Meeting, we will be honoring two dedicated first responders; one from the nearby West Los Angeles Police station and one from the local fire station no. 92 just a few blocks away from the Lodge on Pico.

I'm also pleased to welcome Brother Aaron Gonzales to our Lodge. Brother Gonzales comes to us from Belize, where his Lodge is the single regular and recognized Lodge in the entire country. Steadfast Lodge is actually chartered under the Grand Lodge of Florida. and while we are currently going through the process of helping Brother Gonzales transfer his membership to our Lodge (which as an EA, involves a demit from his parent Lodge), I wanted to share with the Brethren an interesting and rather surprising fact about where he comes from. When asked about the dues structure for our Lodge, Brother Gonzales evinced total shock when he learned our total annual dues were \$185. When asked why he was so surprised by this amount, he informed me that his Lodge brothers pay \$400 for their Lodge membership ... per month!

That's right – \$400 per month! That translates to \$4,800 a year in total! The application for the 3 degrees alone is \$1,500 at their Lodge!

Apparently, some large chunk of that goes back tothe Grand Lodge of Florida, and his lodge does boast Prime Ministers both present and historical, the Mayor, Chief of Police, Chief Justice, and other members of the Belize elite. Brother Gonzales, however, is proof that not only the elite are welcomed at that lodge, however, despite the high price of membership (which does not, in case you were wondering, include dinners, events, or anything other than

base membership). Brother Gonzales is not a man of political or social honors; he is just a man who is dedicated to the principles of the Craft, and believed that \$400 a month was worth the cost.

I bring this up not to scare anyone – we have no intention of modeling our dues after their Lodge; I firmly believe that Masonry should be accessible to all, not merely the wealthy or elite – but it does bring up an interesting point. When asked about the relative level of engagement and activity at his Lodge, Brother Gonzales told me that practically everyone regularly attends the Lodge meetings. After all, as he pointed out, it would be absolutely crazy to pay that much not to come to Lodge, right?

This made me think about the number of sadly empty chairs we see on a regular basis in the Lodge room during Stated Meetings and Degrees. I understand that many of our Lodge brothers are of an age where they are no longer as independently mobile, and many live some distance away from our present location, but there are certainly younger members who could spare one night a month to get away from the outside world and take a moment to recharge their spirits with some time spent with their Brethren. I am reminded of the assurance that we give to all potential candidates that we will never ask them to do that which would interfere with their lives or previous commitments. I myself have just started a Master's program in Clinical Psychology (specializing in Trauma). I am busier than ever, but I am at Lodge, week in and week out, to ground myself with the anchor of the Fraternity. I get to recharge my own psyche by being viscerally reminded that there are still good people in this world, and that despite all the ugliness all the hatred, and all the division that we see outside our walls, inside the Lodge room there are only Brothers on whom one can always depend. Come back to Lodge and remind yourself too.

FROM THE WEST

It was just over eighteen years ago that I submitted my Petition For The Degrees Of Masonry. On one hand it seems that I have been a Mason much longer than that, but, on the other hand, much shorter. THINK ABOUT IT

Especially since the George Floyd incident in 2020, discussions have been held regarding reparation payments to living Black Americans because their ancestors had suffered the injustices of slavery. At that time, California's governor, Gavin Newsom, created a task force to make recommendations about reparations in his state. The nine members of that task force recently released their 1080-page report, along with a 74page executive summary. They recommended that a large sum of money be directly paid to every descendant who had at least one ancestor who was a slave; in fact, some reports in the press indicate that a person who was a descendant of any Black person (slave or not) living in California up to the end of the 19th Century would be eligible. The total cash payment to eligible recipients in California has been estimated to be \$800 billion. The city of San Francisco has gone even further, recommending that every Black resident in that city should receive a \$5 million payment. Not surprisingly, these recommendations have been met with a large public outcry. The sum is seemingly unrealistic, since that total is 2-3 times the entire state budget.

This entire scenario seems analogous to a civil lawsuit in which one party (the plaintiff) sues another (the defendant) for damages. In this case, the Black descendants are the plaintiffs and the state is the defendant. If the plaintiff prevails, the defendant's penalty typically is to pay a sum of money to the plaintiff. Once the settlement is culminated, the case is over and the plaintiff has been compensated for his or her loss. The plaintiffs cannot go back and demand more money.

From this perspective, a reparation payment does not seem to make any sense. The problems outlined in the panel report largely focused on the history of what were perceived as short- and long-term effects of racism. Giving money to a group of Blacks does not seem to solve any current residual racist issues in the state. However, by accepting the payments, Black Californians would seem to be sacrificing any further efforts to resolve these issues. After all, those past injustices have now been "repaired". Organizations that are based on past racial inequalities would no longer be necessary or appropriate.

What has been less-well publicized is that the report also contained a host of other suggestions to deal with past and current alleged racial inequalities. Many of them would require substantial funding and, in this regard, it was curious to me that the panel did not estimate those or deduct them from the total reparation that they believed the state owed the eligible Black Californians. While I did not necessarily agree with all of those suggestions, at least some of them more directly address current issues and would do more to improve the situation in the Black community than would a one-time payment to people who, for the most part, are not in positions to change what is going on in society.

Think about it.
