Dear Brethren,

Winter is always a hard time of the year for me, as it is for many. When storm clouds gather overhead and the sun's rays are obscured, it can be hard to feel hope or joy. Intellectually, we know that this will pass; it is in part a biological side effect of the reduced rate of UV-induced vitamin D production, in part a trained and socialized conceptualization of winter as being "dreary" and "dark" and "gloomy", and in part a number of other, more personalized factors. Many people get depressed when it rains, even as they know that rain is necessary for new life.

For me, this period has become even more difficult in the past six years, since the death of my father, who passed away on January 25, 2019. Because of the vagaries of the Jewish lunar calendar, his Yahrzeit – the date of his death according to the Hebrew calendar, on which a memorial candle is lit and the Kaddish (mourner's prayer) is recited in his memory – fell out in mid-February this year. This year, between the devastation of the wildfires, the social turmoil throughout the world due to wars, politics, and terrorism, and my own life events, his loss hit particularly hard these past few weeks.

As things currently stand, I am set to graduate with a master's degree in clinical psychology in June. My father will not be in the crowd watching me accept my degree. My nephew will turn 5 years old on March 5. My father, for whom he is named in part, never got to meet him, or his younger sister.

There are so many things about him that I miss, and so many times I find myself wishing I could share this or that with him, either for a shared laugh, a bit of wise counsel, or because I feel he would have been proud of that fact that, after a long and difficult road, I finally seem to have my life on its proper course.

However, despite the fact that he isn't physically here, his memory and his influence live on. My father was not a Mason, because he discovered Masonry too late in life, and realized that, as an expectant father (at the time) he didn't feel he could give it the necessary time commitment it deserved. But when I needed guidance and an anchor back in 2008, it was my father who steered me towards Masonry. It was my father who encouraged me to talk to several good men I knew from Sinai Temple, who just happened to be Masons (and not incidentally, members of Ionic Composite). It was my father who taught me that anything worth doing is worth doing *right*, and that while working smart rather than hard is acceptable for the sake of efficiency, it should never come at the expense of quality craftsmanship. It was, after all, my father who taught me to use my working tools (literal and metaphorical), long before I knew of their Masonic symbolism or significance.

It is therefore of my father that I find myself thinking as I find myself rapidly approaching the point for which I have been anxiously waiting and tirelessly working alongside many others in our Lodge for the past three years and more. Brethren, at long last, we are about to start raising the first of our new cohort of young, enthusiastic, and actively engaged young men to the degree of Master Mason! It has taken a lot of time, sweat, and tears from many of our dedicated officers, our tireless prospect manager, and brethren who have stepped up from the sidelines to help out and pitch in when called on to get us to this point, but we have finally arrived at the threshold of

a new spring for Ionic Composite. The winter has been long, we have endured fires and floods, earthquakes and pandemics, false starts and more frustrations than I care to name, but at last, the first promise of spring has arrived.

Over my time as Master, I have often found myself comparing our Lodge to a fruit tree that required transplantation. During my first term, the tree was moved, it celebrated its former life and prepared for rebirth. During my second term, its roots took hold in the new soil, it sent forth the first tentative connections, seeking anchors in unfamiliar territory, and finished maturing some of the pre-existing fruit already on the branches. Last year, new connections were formed as it sent forth new growth above-ground as well as below, and we saw the first new flowers and buds. This year, new flowers are opening, buds are growing, and the first new fruits are living testament to the fact that yes, we *have* survived, yes, we *will* continue, and yes, our Lodge *is* and *will continue to be* valuable, relevant, and thrive in the years to come.

This month, I am thrilled to be able to announce a whole host of events, accomplishments, and news. Grand Lodge has confirmed that, once again, we have maintained our record as the first and only Lodge to reach 100% officer giving *every year since it was first tracked*. We have the first of our 2025 Masonic speaker nights, with Worshipful Nicholas Mitchel giving a talk tiled in the first degree to all Masons who are interested in coming on March 10th. We will be going downtown to serve dinner at the Midnight Mission on March 16th, and I encourage everyone to sign up for that. We are holding the first of what I hope to be several Third Degree conferrals for the year on March 31st. We have confirmed dates for our 2025 Festive Board (May 25th), our annual Grand Master's Reception (a lunch affair on Sunday, July 20th), and a whole host of other events are already on our master calendar.

It's been a dark and difficult winter, brethren, but the memory of the lost help light the path forward through the darkness, and the light of spring is visible on the ever-nearing horizon. We just this week initiated a new brother, and I for one am eager to see where, in due time, he and his cohort will take our Lodge in years to come.

I wish everyone good health and comfort in the wake of fires and losses, and hope that all the brethren remember that the Lodge is always a place they can turn to for help, comfort, and support. Our doors are always open for you, brethren. I'll see you at Lodge.

Think About It – Ron Koretz, P.M. Think About It

Beginning about 40 years ago, I became very disenchanted with sports in general. I viewed professional athletes as being overpaid, selfish, and only interested in promoting themselves. I learned about autograph sessions where fans, often children, would be charged \$10 to \$20 just to stand in line and ultimately receive a piece of paper signed by a particular sports figure. Driven by these large salaries and by desires for profit, the costs of tickets to attend games skyrocketed. It was a hardship for many people even to take their family to a single game and season tickets were largely owned only by wealthy individuals or businesses and corporations. College athletics were becoming tainted with these same behaviors. Even before college athletes started getting paid for the use of their NILs (names, images, likenesses) and transferring schools through portals, the universities were looking for larger television and radio contracts. My final straw was when UCLA added a surcharge to the season football tickets; in order to obtain them, one had to make a sizeable contribution to the school. I surrendered my own season tickets in protest (even though, as faculty, I did not have to contribute).

About 15 years ago, I discovered that I had to become reacquainted with sports because my grandchildren, especially my grandsons, wanted to talk about them. I then had a remarkable experience with one particular athlete, Mike Trout, which demonstrated to me that some of these athletes are worthy of respect. As the years have passed, I have seen other professional athletes demonstrating their appreciation and regard for the fans and their concerns about what is happening in the world in general. Consider the recent efforts by many of them locally in donating their time and money to assist victims of the fires and salute first responders.

I was thus particularly taken with the actions of Saquon Barkley, a running back for the Philadelphia Eagles, during that team's celebratory parade after winning the Super Bowl. Mr. Barkley chose not to ride on top of the team transport, but rather walked the parade route and greeted fans in the process. During that walk, he happened to see the ball boy for the team standing in the crowd. He stopped, lifted the boy over the barricade, and had him join the march. He then stopped to greet a 3-year old girl who carried a sign declaring it was her birthday, picked her up, and took photographs with her, much to the delighted surprise of her parents. He chose to make some remarks at the end of the parade, but only did so accompanied by Ryan Quigley, a man whose friend had been killed in the terrorist attack in New Orleans a few weeks earlier.

Athletes are idolized by fans, and it is gratifying to see that some of them understand that fact and are willing to give back to their communities.
