

Think About It

In the past few years, baseball teams have adopted a practice of celebrating home runs by their players by having them wear or carry some article when they return to the dugout after circling the bases. For example, a Cincinnati Red sports a Viking helmet complete with horns and a trident is given to a Seattle Mariner upon entering the dugout. These various symbols are typically representations of power, reflecting the strength of the player who hit the ball hard enough to drive it over the fence. A couple of years ago, the Los Angeles Angels began placing an ornate Samurai helmet on the heads of the players; that helmet was ordered from Japan by Shohei Ohtani when he was on that team.

In the case of the Angels, the tradition was somewhat modified at the suggestion of Mike Trout. This year, the player is rewarded with the temporary wearing of a fire hat. It turns out that Trout had a friend in the fire department and he thought that it would be an appropriate acknowledgement for first responders to celebrate in their "name". It was part of the response that the Angels, as well as our other local soccer (Angel City FC, Galaxy, LAFC), football (Chargers, Rams), basketball (Lakers, Clippers, Sparks), hockey (Kings, Ducks), and baseball (Dodgers) professional sports teams made to the victims of our recent fires. It is the intention of the Angels to have all of the players on the team sign the fire hat at the end of the season and then auction it off as a further contribution. In the meantime, first responders all over southern California can gain a moment of appreciation whenever an Angel hits a home run.

I was reminded of the meaning of the fire hat when I had the occasion to have lunch with some doctors who had all been in my medical school class. We were discussing how medicine had changed over the decades, realizing that many of those changes were directed more at increasing income than improving patient care. I posed a question to the group, namely if they had the opportunity to redo their career decisions today knowing what was happening in the field, would they still choose to go into medicine. One of them, who had spent decades as a pediatrician, said he would. I asked him why and his response was not exactly what I had expected. While he did recognize that he had had enough financial success that was able to retire comfortably, his real rewards came at the hands of patients at unexpected moments. He cited a time when he walked into a restaurant and one of his young patients became excited and joyfully exclaimed t0 his parents. "Oh, look, there is my doctor" (referring to him by name). The

knowledge that he had had a positive impact on that young man was a reward beyond compensation and represented why he had chosen medicine many years earlier.

For me, the take-home lesson from both of these examples is that true happiness and satisfaction come from experiences that we do not, and cannot, pay for, or even measure in dollars. Life is really at its best when people take the time to let us know that we are important to them.

Think about it.
